



The Curve Question

What are the problems you wish you could solve and you don't have a clue of how to do it?

Imperative to keep track of these !

Innovation and Mutualism

Mutualism is one of three kinds of relationships living organisms have with one another:

- Parasitism
- Commensalism
- Mutualism

Definition of Mutualism

- Mutualism is the combining of differences to solve complex problems.
- Each element must gain something plus the partnership must gain something win/win/win!
- Each participant must give up something as part of the mutualistic partnership.

The Power of Mutualism

...lies in the creation of new combinations **based on differences** instead of similarities.

Mutualism & Innovation

Mutualism is the process that converts diversity into new ideas through the combination of already established elements.
